

Care Arrangements and Activities in South Korea by Eunhye Kang, Ki-Soo Eun, Jiweon Jun, Seung-Eun Cha and Hyuna Moon presents a portrait of care arrangements and characteristics of (unpaid) caregiving activities for children and the elderly in South Korea, using the data collected from the Care Work Family Surveys conducted in 2018 as part of the CWE-GAM field work in Korea. <u>Estimating the Paid Care Sector in South Korea</u> by Joo Yeoun Suh provides a comprehensive picture of the paid care workforce in South Korea by measuring its size and extrapolating the median wage earnings and aggregate hours spent on caregiving by the workers using the following data sources: the Local Area Labor Force Survey, Child Care Statistics, Social Services Voucher Statistics, and Long-term Care Insurance Statistical Yearbook.

The Qualitative Methodology and Survey Instruments by Hyuna Moon, Seung-Eun Cha, Ki-Soo Eun, Eunhye Kang and Ito Peng outlines the process and methodology used in CWE-GAM project's qualitative field work in 2018 that set out to gain a deeper understanding of the nature of care work and the well-being of caregivers in the context of Korea. As part of this field work, CTMS and Gallup Korea joined together to conduct 96 comprehensive narratives of caregiving, one of which is published in this recent blog.
